13 simple things you may not know about home safety

- 1. Store valuables in your child's sock drawer rather than in your nightstand. Thieves often scour the master bedroom but tend to leave children's rooms untouched.
- 2. If your front entrance contains decorative glass, install your security keypad in a spot that is not visible from the doorstep. That way, burglars won't be able to peer in and see if the alarm is set.
- 3. A mail slot goes against the wood grain, weakening the horizontal integrity of a door and making it easier to kick in. Opt for a mailbox, or install your slot near the bottom of the front door, no higher than a quarter of the way up.
- 4. Keep car keys next to your bed while you sleep. If you hear a suspicious noise and suspect that someone is trying to break in, press the Panic button on your key ring. The car alarm will sound, and the burglar will have no choice but to flee the scene.
- 5. Plant thorny shrubs, such as rosebushes, beneath ground-floor windows. They'll add beauty to your garden and deter burglars. (cont. on page 7)



- 6. If you're going away on vacation, ask a neighbor to check daily for fliers stuck in your front door. Crafty criminals have been known to leave pizza ads in doors to see how long it takes for residents to remove them.
- 7. Rather than loading up the car the night before a weekend getaway, quickly do it in the morning right before you leave. Left in front of the house, a fully packed car can serve as a green light for those looking for one.
- 8. Lower the volume of your telephone ringer. This way a passerby won't be able to hear it go to voice mail, which is an indication that no one is home.
- 9. Don't store wood near the side of the house, as it can easily be used by intruders as a stepladder up to a window. Keep logs in the garage or in a pile at the edge of the yard.
- 10. If a yard worker or unknown visitor uses the bathroom, he may unlatch the window so he can gain entry later. Be sure to double-check the lock.
- 11. Choose your locksmith wisely. Some are unlicensed or dishonest so always look for a well-established locksmith business that is bonded and insured.
- 12. If you don't have a security system, at least purchase a decal. If you cannot afford a security system, buy an alarm or patrol service decal to place on your front door. While an accomplished thief is not fooled, decals may deter a less-experienced thief from entering.
- 13. Join a community-wide crime-prevention program like Nextdoor.com

Cook Park Neighborhood wins award with Virginia Village

There are approximately 100 neighborhood organizations in the city of Denver. Inter-Neighborhood Cooperation (INC)'s mission is "to advocate for Denver citizens by bringing together, informing, and empowering Denver neighborhood organizations to actively engage in city issues." This is pursued by volunteers at all levels, and through monthly meetings of INC.

At the annual INC meeting on January 30, 2014, awards were announced to acknowledge individual and group contributions to strengthening it mission. This year, Virginia Village/Ellis and Cook Park neighborhoods together received the INC Dollar Dictionary Drive award, based on their cooperative efforts as they participated in an INC city-wide project: Donating to each third-grader in Denver Public Schools a dictionary and a thesaurus. In 2013, books were given to about 6700 students.

The Dollar Dictionary Drive Award is defined thusly: Awarded in memory of Nancy Jackson to a person (or group) who has made an outstanding or innovative contribution to the Dollar Dictionary Drive, such as financial, personal time, public relations, fund raising, etc.

The award will be received by local leaders in the book distributions to third-graders at Ellis Elementary School: Diane Wolta and Barbara Fallon.

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MAKING SENSE OF INVESTING

Be aware of the risks of not investing



You've no doubt heard about the risks associated with investing. This investment carries this type of risk, while that investment carries another one. And it is certainly true that all investments do involve some form of risk. But what about not investing? Isn't there some risk associated with that, too?

• You might not keep up with inflation. After all, you might reason, your principal is protected — so even if you don't really make any money, you're not losing it either. But that's not strict-

ly true, because if your money is in investment vehicles that don't even keep up with inflation, you can lose ground. In fact, even at a relatively mild 3% annual inflation rate, your purchasing power will decline by about half in just 25 years.

- You might outlive your money. For a 65-year-old couple, there's a 50% chance that one spouse will live past age 90, according to the Society of Actuaries. This statistic suggests that you may need your investments to help provide enough income to sustain you for two, or even three, decades in retirement.
- You might not be able to maintain your financial independence. Even if you don't totally run out of money, you could end up scrimping by or, even worse, you could become some-
- what dependent on your grown children for financial assistance. For most people, this prospect is unacceptable. Consequently, you'll want to make appropriate financial decisions to help maintain your financial independence.
- You might not be able to retire on your terms. You would probably like to decide when you retire and how you'll retire that is, what sort of lifestyle you'll pursue during retirement. But both these choices may be taken out of your hands if you haven't invested enough to retire on your own terms.
- You might not be able to leave the type of legacy you desire. Like most people, you would probably like to be able to leave something behind to your family and to those charitable organizations you support. You can help create this type of legacy through the appropriate legal vehicles i.e., a will, a living trust and so on but you'll still need to fund these mechanisms somehow. That means you'll need to draw on all your financial assets, including your investments.

Work with your financial advisor to determine the mixture of growth and income investments you need during your working years and as you move toward retirement to help you meet your retirement goals. However you do it, get into the habit of investing, and never lose it — because the risks of not investing are just too great.








When Kids Love to Learn, Everyone Wins

"We are crew, not passengers." This is the essence of the Rocky Mountain School of Expeditionary Learning (RMSEL). Started in 1993, RMSEL was among the first 10 Expeditionary Learning (EL) schools that opened in 5 U.S. cities. A K-12 public school of choice, with 400 students, RMSEL partners with 5 school districts: Aurora, Cherry Creek, Denver, Douglas County, and Littleton. Students learn to be responsible citizens, and part of RMSEL's vision is to "equip our students with tools for success in order to make a positive impact on our local and global community."



EXPEDITIONARY LEARNING CORE PRACTICES

There are 5 core practices that all EL schools operate under:

- 1. Curriculum: Rigorous learning is achieved through learning expeditions, case studies, fieldwork, and service learning.
- 2. Instruction: Discovery, critical thinking, problem solving, and collaboration strongly connect students to their learning goals.
- 3. Student Assessment: This empowers children to take ownership of their learning. They use models, reflection, critique, rubrics, and work with experts to achieve their self-defined goals.
- 4. Culture & Character: Students are immersed in a culture of caring. Compassion, integrity, responsibility, kindness and courage are the 5 character traits that are woven into daily lessons.
- 5. Leadership: Staff uses data judiciously to

ensure equity, set goals, monitor progress, and build a culture of trust and partnerships. Students experience powerful opportunities to help others in their school and community. (cont. on page 10)

SERVICE LEARNING

Volunteering in the community teaches students that helping others is fundamental to being a thoughtful, knowledgeable citizen. At RMSEL, service learning is an integral part of the learning process. Starting in 3rd grade, students are expected to meet various requirements as individuals and with their crews.

PASSAGE PANEL VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

Every May, students in 3rd, 5th, 8th, 10th, and 12th grade go through "Passages." It's a two-day event: Reading Day, in which panelists pore over students' portfolios, and Presentation Day, when students come in to answer questions from their panels. The role of the passage panel is to prompt each student to reflect deeply about their work," says Marci Elder, Director of Curriculum and Instruction. Panelists are asked to commit to both days.
